Four software audit prep and survival tips for utility CIOs



Don't wait until it happens.

The more proof of legitimate usage you have, the safer you will be.



Pay attention to timelines and developments.

The more time that has passed since your last software license audit, the more likely a new one becomes.



Don't delete software or panic-buy licenses.

If an audit notice arrives, do not try to manage the situation by making reactionary changes.



Get help before and during the audit.
